## Key Findings

**C** Florida earns a grade of C- and national ranking of 35th on the Health & Well-Being Composite Index, an improvement over the D+ the state received in the 2004 *The Status of Women in the States* report.

### Florida's Progress on Key Indicators of Women's Employment & Earnings

Florida has improved on four of the Women's Health & Well-Being key indicators and declined on five since the 2004 *Status of Women in the States* report.

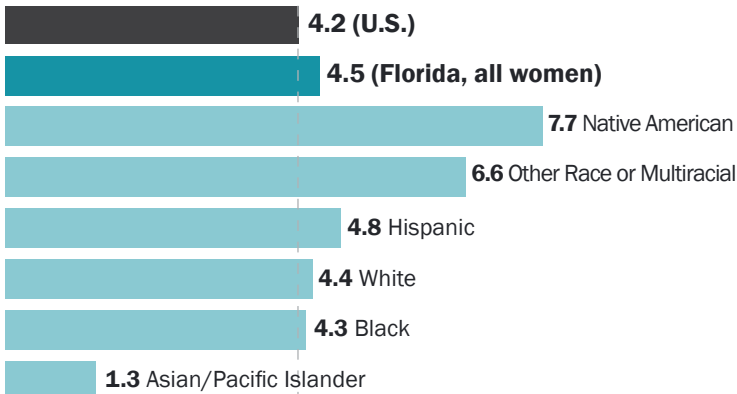

### Mental Health

Women are more likely than men to suffer from certain mental health conditions, including mood and anxiety disorders. Many factors contribute to women's greater likelihood of being diagnosed with such conditions, including higher rates of poverty and trauma from gender-based violence.

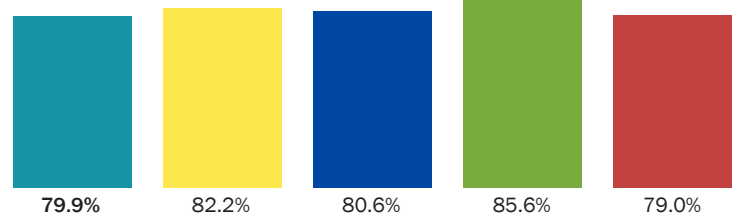
#### Average Number of Days per Month of Poor Mental Health Among Florida Women, by Race and Ethnicity, 2015



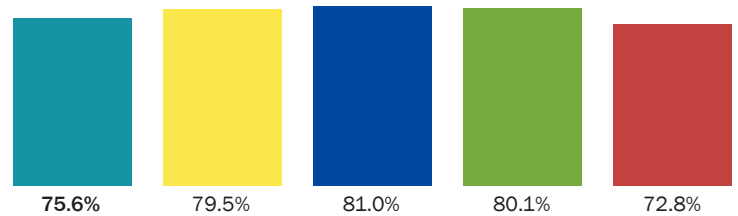
### Health Behaviors and Preventive Care Among Florida Women in Florida Cities

Health-related behaviors and practices can either improve or undermine women's health and overall well-being.

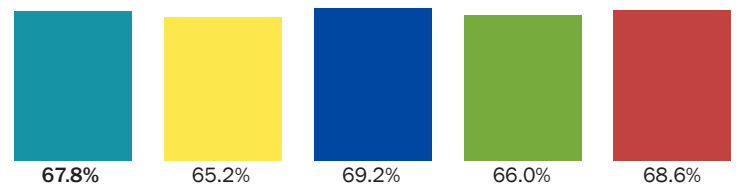
Percent Aged 50 and Older Who Have Had a Mammogram in the Past Two Years, 2014



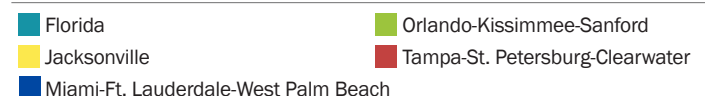
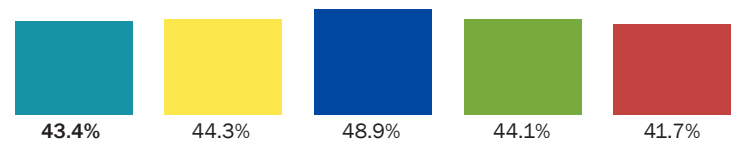
Percent Who Have Had a Pap Test in the Past Three Years, 2014

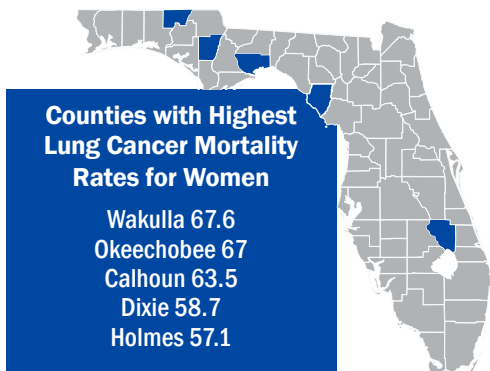
## Key Findings

### Chronic Disease

Mortality rates vary substantially by race and ethnicity; however, black women in Florida have higher mortality rates and incidences of chronic disease in almost every category.

#### Lung Cancer

Lung cancer is the most lethal cancer for women in Florida, and the state ranks **19th out of 51**. White women have the highest rate – almost three times higher than Hispanic women, the racial and ethnic group with the lowest rate.



#### Heart Disease

In Florida, the heart disease mortality rate for women is 115.6, lower than the national rate (133.2), ranking **13th in the nation**. The rate among Florida Black women is 24% higher than the rate for all women.

#### Breast Cancer

Florida ranks 15th out of 51 for women's breast cancer mortality rate. The breast cancer mortality rate for Florida women, 19.4, is lower than the national rate of 20.6. Like heart disease mortality, breast cancer mortality is highest for Black women in Florida.

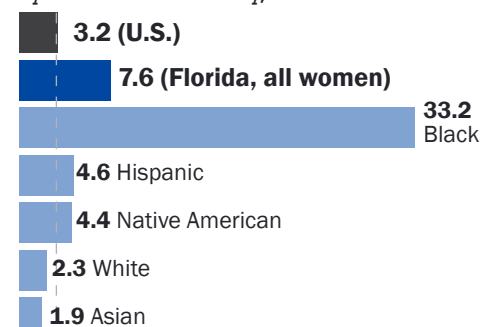
#### Diabetes

In Florida, 10.9% of women aged 18 and older have been told they have diabetes, which is in the **bottom third in the nation (a ranking of 39th)**. Black women in Florida are nearly 2.5 times as likely to have ever been told they have diabetes as Asian/Pacific Islander women, who have the lowest rate.

#### AIDS Diagnoses

**Florida ranks 48th out of 51 for its high rate of AIDS diagnoses (7.6)**. The rate of women's AIDS diagnoses in Florida is more than twice the national rate of 3.2. The rate of diagnoses for Black women in Florida is more than four times greater than the rate for Florida women overall.

AIDS Diagnoses Among Florida Women, by Race and Ethnicity, 2015

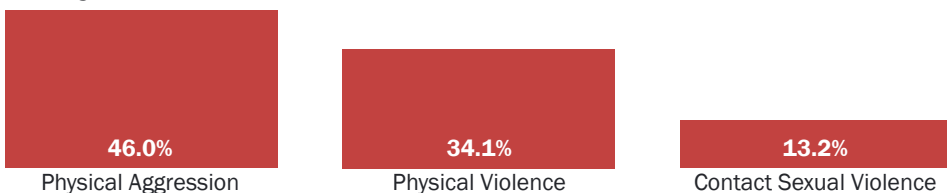

### Violence Against Women

Violence against women takes many forms and can lead to a range of negative effects, including being fearful, symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder, missing school or work, injury and need for medical, legal and/or housing services.

Lifetime Prevalence of Sexual Violence Victimization by an Intimate Partner Among Florida Women, 2010-2012

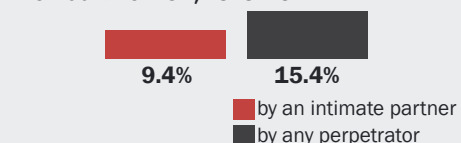


**More than one in seven Florida women have been stalked by a perpetrator.**

#### Common Stalking Tactics include

making unwanted phone calls or text messages, threatening physical harm, damaging personal property, approaching the victim or showing up unexpectedly in places such as home, school or work.

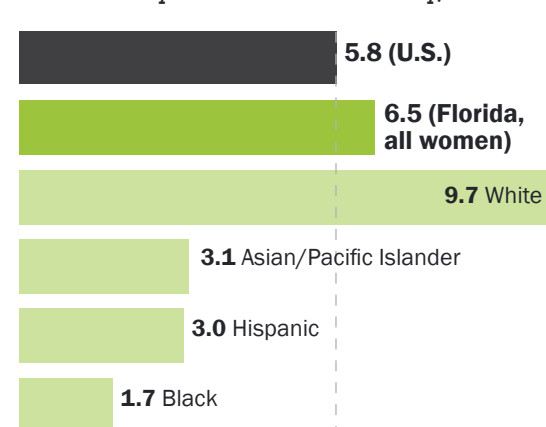
Lifetime Prevalence of Stalking Among Florida Women, 2010-2012



### Suicide

In the U.S. and Florida, women are much less likely than men to commit suicide; however, women are as likely as men to engage in suicidal behaviors and more likely to have suicidal thoughts.
